
Critically analysing texts: 1.3 Unfamiliar Texts

- Look at the <u>title</u>
- What type of text is it?
- A speech?

- A magazine article?
- A poem?
- An advertisement/photograph/image?

A speech might have: Persuasive language

- Rhetorical questions
- Imperitive (Command)
- Statements, facts, statistics....etc.

Words that connect with the audience

- Personal Pronouns
- Anecdotes, cliché, pun, humour etc.

- A story might have...
- Lots of descriptions:
- Similes, Metaphors, Personification...
 Names of things/Nouns (objects, people, places...)
 - A magazine article might have...
- Facts, statistics, quotations...etc.
- A poem might have...
 - Rhyme, rhythm, images, sounds....

The ocean of Raglan is where the surfies are found. At Whale and many Bay, they bob in the water waiting for that special wave. Seen from the cliff nearby, they are tiny dots in a corrugates sea. What is the feeling of the text?

- Look at the title/subject
- Look at the purpose
- Look at the word choice
- Look at the sentence structures

Short, sharp abrupt/ Long, flowing, descriptive

Words to describe tone

(The feeling/atmosphere of the text)

Negative/Sad/Depressing.... Positive/Happy/Optimistic.... **Nostalgic/Longing/Reminiscent...** Fearful/ Angry/Aggressive... Light-hearted/Thoughtful/Reflective and so on...

The attitude of the writer

What is the writer's opinion on the subject?

The attitude of the writer

- Does the writer believe what they are saying?

- Is the writer presenting someone else's point of view/opinion.

I.e. An editor of a newspaper, voicing the paper's opinion

Writing a detailed response on a text

First sentence: Use the words from the question **State your point Expand/Explain with details Examples/quotations**- give supportive evidence (and name the techniques used in these) Response line-what have you shown? How is the reader impacted? What do they learn about the world and people?

Writing a detailed response on a text

First sentence: <u>Use the words from the question</u>

State your point: The purpose of the text is to.......

Expand/Explain with details: *The writer wants the reader to.../ The text is about....*

Examples/quotations: *This is shown in the text in the personal pronouns, "We," "Our," "Us"......*

Response line This shows that everyone is responsible for racial equality in society. All citizens, regardless of culture, gender and age must put aside their differences and acknowledge every individuals right to be treated fairly. This text illustrates this point through the purposeful selection of persuasive language.
